Tree Planting (Gamuda Parks) –28 Feb 2025

On this day, Gamuda Parks and their amazing team visited Dwi Emas to give a talk and host a special activity with our Biosphere students, planting 20 trees all around the school.

About the talk

Before planting the trees, we had a 20-minute talk and briefing by the team from Gamuda Parks. It was really interesting to learn about different career paths in environmental conservation and sustainability. They also explained why tree planting is so important, especially in urban areas like ours. It gave us a better understanding of how our small actions can contribute to a greener future.

We also learned a lot about the future of outdoor design, both from an aesthetic and environmentally friendly point of view. One of the highlights was learning about the role of an outdoor architect—someone who designs parks and green spaces to be both beautiful and sustainable.
